Background

- Its been a long time coming!
- Archaeological archives have been unable to be collected and stored in Northants for over 20 years.
- There are over 20,000 boxes of archaeological archives from Northants that will end up at the ARC.
- The vast majority of the archive collections have been inaccessible to the public and researchers.
- Much of the existing collection is held in completely unsuitable conditions and all over the country.





The Northamptonshire ARC

- Central Archaeological Archive Repository for all of Northants.
- Open public access to archives and facilities for all researchers.
- Ability to loan objects within the collection.
 - Short or long term loans for display for other museum/heritage organisations.
 - Research loans to universities.
- State of the art climate controlled facility space for over 32,000 boxes of archaeological archives.
- Integrated into the planning processes.
- Outreach events using archaeological archives.





Our Next Steps

- Building expected to be signed over in March.
- Move 16,000+ boxes from existing stores from March-May.
- Beginning the re-packaging and cataloguing process in May.
 - Over 10,000 boxes need replacing.
 - Almost none of the archive is properly catalogued.
 - Expected to take 8-10 years.
- Hoping to open to volunteers and the public in June (Covid dependant!).
- Finally, we will be working towards ACE Museum Accreditation once open.
